
# Global Competence in teaching practice

## **Approaches**

- → Integrated in subject lessons
- → Cross-curricular
- → Extra-curricular / outside school
- → Mobility programmes
- → Virtual exchanges

#### Methods

- → Experiential
- → Reflective
- → Project- and/or service-based
- → Peer-based / cooperative
- → Real life encounters



## Leveraging cooperation with Non-Formal Education

## How to cooperate?

- → One-off interventions / training
- Joint projects in local community
- → International exchanges
- Long-term multilayer cooperation

### Possible steps to take

- → Map local non-formal education experts
- → Meet to discuss needs and ideas, involve other school/community stakeholders
- → Engage as a volunteer in an NFE organisation
- → Apply jointly for local or Erasmus+ funding

# How to become globally competent as a teacher?

- Take GC trainings.
- Volunteer in local organisations.
- Be aware of local and global issues and exercise in finding suitable solutions from the teaching perspective.
- Engage in international projects (teachers' exchanges, online discussions...).
- Look for alliances in the community and school.
- Identify, interact and try to understand the diversity of the students you work with (context, their circumstances...).
- Identify your own biases and work on a clear strategy to manage them correctly.
- Detect the potential of your subject to solve or commit to find solutions to global issues.
